# **Online Safety Policy**

# 1. Monitoring and Review

- 1.1 The school will monitor the impact of the policy using:
  - Logs of reported incidents
  - Monitoring logs of internet activity (including sites visited) / filtering
  - Internal monitoring data for network activity
  - Surveys / questionnaires of
    - o pupils
    - o parents / carers
    - staff

# 2. Scope of the Policy

- 2.1 This policy applies to all members of the school community (including staff, pupils, volunteers, parents / carers, visitors, community users) who have access to and are users of school ICT systems, both in and out of the *school*.
- 2.2 The Education and Inspections Act 2006 empowers Headteachers to such extent as is reasonable, to regulate the behaviour of pupils when they are off the *school* site and empowers members of staff to impose disciplinary penalties for inappropriate behaviour. This is pertinent to incidents of cyber-bullying or other Online Safety incidents covered by this policy, which may take place outside of the *school*, but is linked to membership of the school. The 2011 Education Act increased these powers with regard to the searching for and of electronic devices and the deletion of data (see appendix for template policy). In the case of both acts, action can only be taken over issues covered by the published Behaviour Policy.
- 2.3 The school will deal with such incidents within this policy and associated behaviour and anti-bullying policies and will, where known, inform parents / carers of incidents of inappropriate Online Safety behaviour that take place out of school.

# 3. Roles and Responsibilities

3.1 The following section outlines the online safety roles and responsibilities of individuals and groups within the school:

#### 3.2 Governors:

Governors are responsible for the approval of the Online Safety Policy and for reviewing the effectiveness of the policy. A member of the Governing Body has taken on the role of Online Safety Governor. The role of the Online Safety Governor will include:

- regular meetings with the Online Safety Co-ordinator
- regular monitoring of online safety incident logs
- reporting to relevant Governors / Committee meetings

#### 3.3 Headteacher and Senior Leaders:

- The Headteacher has a duty of care for ensuring the safety (including online safety) of members of the school community, though the day-to-day responsibility for online safety will be delegated to the Online Safety Coordinator.
- The Headteacher and (at least) another member of the Senior Leadership Team / Senior Management Team should be aware of the procedures to be followed in the event of a serious online safety allegation being made against a member of staff. (see flow chart on dealing with online safety incidents – included in a later section – "Responding to incidents of misuse" and relevant Local Authority HR / other relevant body disciplinary procedures). - The Headteacher / Senior Leaders are responsible for ensuring that the Online Safety Coordinator and other relevant staff receive suitable training to enable them to carry out their online safety roles and to train other colleagues, as relevant.
- The Headteacher / Senior Leaders will ensure that there is a system in place
  to allow for monitoring and support of those in school who carry out the internal
  online safety monitoring role. This is to provide a safety net and also support
  to those colleagues who take on important monitoring roles
- The Senior Leadership Team will receive regular monitoring reports from the Online Safety Co-ordinator.

#### 3.4 Online Safety Coordinator / Officer:

- takes day to day responsibility for online safety issues and has a leading role in establishing and reviewing the school online safety policies / documents
- ensures that all staff are aware of the procedures that need to be followed in the event of an online safety incident taking place.
- provides training and advice for staff
- liaises with the Local Authority where required

- liaises with school technical staff
- receives reports of online safety incidents and creates a log of incidents to inform future online safety developments
- meets regularly with Online Safety Governor to discuss current issues and review incident logs
- attends relevant meeting / committee of Governors
- reports regularly to Senior Leadership Team

#### 3.5 ICT Technician staff:

The ICT Technician responsible for ensuring:

- that the *school's* technical infrastructure is secure and is not open to misuse or malicious attack
- that the *school* meets required online safety technical requirements and any *Local Authority / other relevant body* Online Safety Policy / Guidance that may apply.
- that users may only access the networks through a properly enforced password protection policy, in which passwords are regularly changed
- that web filtering is applied and updated on a regular basis
- that they keep up to date with online safety technical information in order to effectively carry out their online safety role and to inform and update others as relevant
- that the use of the network / internet / social media / remote access / email is regularly monitored in order that any misuse / attempted misuse can be reported to the Headteacher / Senior Leader; Online Safety Coordinator / for investigation / action / sanction
- that monitoring software / systems are implemented and updated as required

#### 3.6 Teaching and Support Staff

Are responsible for ensuring that:

- they have an up to date awareness of online safety matters and of the current school Online Safety Policy and practices
- they have read, understood and signed the Staff Acceptable Use Policy (AUP)
- they report any suspected misuse or problem to the *Headteacher / Senior Leaders*; *Online Safety Coordinator* for investigation / action / sanction
- all digital communications with pupils / parents / carers should be on a professional level and only carried out using official school systems

- online safety issues are embedded in all aspects of the curriculum and other activities
- pupils understand and follow the Online Safety Policy and acceptable use policies
- pupils have a good understanding of research skills and the need to avoid plagiarism and uphold copyright regulations
- they monitor the use of digital technologies, mobile devices, cameras etc in lessons and other school activities (where allowed) and implement current policies with regard to these devices
- in lessons where internet use is pre-planned pupils should be guided to sites checked as suitable for their use and that processes are in place for dealing with any unsuitable material that is found in internet searches

### 3.7 Designated Safeguarding Lead / Designated Person

Should be trained in Online Safety issues and be aware of the potential for serious child protection / safeguarding issues to arise from:

- sharing of personal data
- access to illegal / inappropriate materials
- inappropriate on-line contact with adults / strangers
- potential or actual incidents of grooming
- cyber-bullying

#### 3.8 Students / Pupils:

- are responsible for using the school digital technology systems in accordance with the Pupil Acceptable Use Policy
- have a good understanding of research skills and the need to avoid plagiarism and uphold copyright regulations
- need to understand the importance of reporting abuse, misuse or access to inappropriate materials and know how to do so
- will be expected to know and understand policies on the use of mobile devices and digital cameras. They should also know and understand policies on the taking / use of images and on cyber-bullying.
- should understand the importance of adopting good online safety practice
  when using digital technologies out of school and realise that the school's
  Online Safety Policy covers their actions out of school, if related to their
  membership of the school

#### 3.9 Parents / Carers

Parents / Carers play a crucial role in ensuring that their children understand the need to use the internet / mobile devices in an appropriate way. The school will take every opportunity to help parents understand these issues through parents' evenings, newsletters, letters, website / social media and information about national / local online safety campaigns / literature. Parents and carers will be encouraged to support the school in promoting good online safety practice and to follow guidelines on the appropriate use of:

- digital and video images taken at school events
- supporting children in accessing online services that the school subscribes to

## 4. Policy Statements

Education – Students / Pupils

- 4.1 Whilst regulation and technical solutions are very important, their use must be balanced by educating pupils to take a responsible approach. The education of pupils in online safety is therefore an essential part of the school's online safety provision. Children and young people need the help and support of the school to recognise and avoid online safety risks and build their resilience.
- 4.2 Online safety should be a focus in all areas of the curriculum and staff should reinforce online safety messages across the curriculum. The online safety curriculum should be broad, relevant and provide progression, with opportunities for creative activities and will be provided in the following ways:
  - A planned online safety curriculum should be provided as part of Computing and/or PSHE lessons and should be regularly revisited
  - Key online safety messages should be reinforced as part of a planned programme of assemblies and tutorial / pastoral activities
  - Pupils should be taught in all lessons to be critically aware of the materials / content they access on-line and be guided to validate the accuracy of information.
  - Pupils should be taught to acknowledge the source of information used and to respect copyright when using material accessed on the internet
  - Pupils should be supported in building resilience to radicalisation by providing
    a safe environment for debating controversial issues and helping them to
    understand how they can influence and participate in decision-making.

- Pupils will be helped to understand the need for the pupil Acceptable Use Agreement and encouraged to adopt safe and responsible use both within and outside school.
- Staff should act as good role models in their use of digital technologies, the internet, and mobile devices
- in lessons where internet use is pre-planned, it is best practice that pupils should be guided to sites checked as suitable for their use and that processes are in place for dealing with any unsuitable material that is found in internet searches.
- Where pupils are allowed to freely search the internet, staff should be vigilant in monitoring the content of the websites the young people visit.
- It is accepted that, from time to time, in internet monitoring reports, violations may occur linked to curriculum topics. The Online Safety Coordinator will investigate all violations and take appropriate action, in conjunction with the DSL where necessary
- Lessons adhere to guidelines issued by the DfE in the document 'Teaching Online Safety In Schools' published in June 2019
- Lessons meet objectives set out in the 'Education for a Connected World' framework published by UK Council for Internet Safety in 2020

#### Education – Parents / Carers

- 4.3 Many parents and carers have only a limited understanding of online safety risks and issues, yet they play an essential role in the education of their children and in the monitoring / regulation of the children's on-line behaviours. Parents may underestimate how often children and young people come across potentially harmful and inappropriate material on the internet and may be unsure about how to respond.
- 4.4 The school / academy will therefore seek to provide information and awareness to parents and carers through:
  - Curriculum activities
  - Letters, newsletters, web site
  - Parents evenings
  - High profile events / campaigns e.g. Safer Internet Day
